2022 Hero Awards Gala

n June 2, First Responders Children's Foundation hosted its annual Gala event, "A Celebration of First Responder Heroes" at the elegant Gotham Hall in New York. The festive event recognized James M. Foote, President & CEO of CSX, the premier transportation company, as the 2022 Corporate Hero Award. CSX Pride in Service has partnered with FRCF to provide grants to first responders of every discipline, as well as scholarships for children to pursue their dreams of higher education.

The event also paid tribute to 6.5 million first responders across the nation through "The Roll Call of Heroes", with a representative from each category of first responder honored on behalf of all public safety officers, firefighters, EMTs/paramedics, nurses, 911 dispatchers, and 9/11 survivors.

"We are humbled by the dedication and bravery of all the first responders honored in our Roll Of Heroes," said Jillian Crane, President and CEO of First Responders Children's Foundation. "We are also delighted to honor Mr. James M. Foote on behalf of CSX Pride in Service for their dedication to first responders and their families."

Captain Will Davis, of the Joplin MO Police Department, who courageously stopped an assailant who had taken the lives of two fellow officers.

"THERAPY HELPS ME GRIEVE MY FATHER," SAYS TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIP STUDENT ANNIE RULE, WHOSE FATHER, DEPUTY CONSTABLE CALEB RULE (R) TRAGICALLY LOST HIS LIFE IN THE LINE OF DUTY ON THE SAME DAY THAT ANNIE GRADUATED FROM HIGH SCHOOL.

For over 20 years, First Responders Children's Foundation has focused on the unique needs of the children of first responders, who are now facing even more challenges due to the disruptions of the pandemic and the increasingly stressful and dangerous conditions, encountered every day, by their brave first responder parents.

Our groundbreaking, new Mental Health Resiliency Program faces these challenges head-on. Serving the children of police, fire, sheriff, emergency medical personnel and 911 dispatchers, we provide free and confidential trauma-informed counseling services for the children of first responders. For children experiencing fear, anxiety, isolation and other conditions, our mental health professionals are available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, in-person or virtual.

Our program launched in May of this year, proudly serving first responder families in California, New York, New Jersey, Florida, Tennessee and Texas, with future plans to expand into more states.

Firefighter Corey Wilcox of the FDNY, who under punishing conditions and at risk to his own life, rescued an unconscious woman from a house fire on Thanksgiving night.

Jody Nixon, RN of Brooklyn, NY, is a Head Nurse in the hectic Emergency Room at Wyckoff Heights Medical Center, where she works non-stop saving lives, running every aspect of the ED and frequently triaging five emergency patients at once.

Paramedic Alanna Badgley of Yonkers, NY, who rescues patients in distress from their homes, many of whom are sick, injured, terrified and dying. She never fails to provide expert prehospital medical care with empathy and humanity.

911 dispatcher Jonathan Ortiz of the NYPD, whose quick action in response to an 'Officers Down' call resulted in rapid help being dispatched and the ambulance route cleared of traffic, giving the wounded officers the medical attention they needed.

9/11 survivor Sal Turturici of

Morganville, NJ, and the FDNY, participated in the 9/11 rescue and recovery effort at the World Trade Center site, where he was tragically exposed to toxic dust, resulting in a diagnosis of terminal cancer. Despite his illness, Sal continues to advocate for all first responders.

Proceeds from the Gala will support a host of Foundation programs, including mental health services for children of first responder families through the newly introduced First Responders Children's Foundation Resiliency Program.

Scholarship Spotlight: Mabel Jesse



N o one is more aware of mental health issues among first responders than Mabel Jesse, 20, recipient of our CSX Pride in Service Scholarship. Mabel's father, firefighter and paramedic Edward Jessie Jr., suffered a back injury while on duty for the City of Green Fire Department in Ohio, requiring four difficult surgeries that ultimately resulted in his retirement from firefighting.

"It changed who he was and forever changed our family," says Mabel. "We've had our ups and downs. You keep working through it, but the longterm effects of my father's injury linger. The importance of mental health with our first responders and their families is so important."

While initially considering a career in law enforcement, Mabel has since shifted her focus to the mental health field as a student at Florida State College at Jacksonville. While working part-time as a substitute teacher, she has also held a job at a facility for kids ages 7 to 17 who struggle with mental health issues.

"We have kids suffering from ODD (Oppositional Defiance Disorder), schizophrenia, kids who are bipolar. It's a lot, they're all different. But as challenging as it can be, I love working with these kids. I couldn't imagine working anywhere else."

Mabel and her family have remained close to FRCF, drawing inspiration from our mission.

"First Responders Children's Foundation has become a family to me," says Mabel. "The foundation has put so much hope back into our lives, and my CSX Pride in Service scholarship meant more to me than just schooling–it gives me pride to continue service in my community."
